Super Squirrels

A virtual lesson to enjoy at home.

Read Aloud!

Fall is here, and squirrels are busy gathering nuts, berries, and seeds to store for winter. Squirrels are scatter hoarders--they bury their food in "caches" to save for later. One squirrel can bury up to 1000 nuts a year! Tricky squirrels will hide behind plants so that other squirrels can't see their caches .

Acorns are a snack that squirrels especially enjoy. Sometimes, squirrels forget where they've buried their acorns. This is one way that new oak trees grow!







Most Eastern Gray Squirrels are (surprise!) gray, but some are black or white. They have white tummies and big, bushy tails. Squirrels are one of the few mammals--animals with fur--that can scamper down a tree head-first. Squirrels "talk" with tail flicks, chatters, cuks, and squeaks. They line their leafy nests with moss, dried grass, and feathers.
