Howard and Mary McCoy

Wild Lines, site-specific sculptures in the Arboretum's forest, continues through September 30. Every other spring since 1999, Centreville environmental artists Howard and Mary McCoy have roamed the Arboretum's forest looking for what they like to call "invitations" to make art. This year, they chose to create sculptures solely with the vines that grow up into the forest's trees. Using them to "draw" in space, the McCoys made frantic scribbles of bittersweet vines around living trees, twirled prickly greenbrier vines into rings, and trimmed grapevines dangling from high branches to make a wide hoop suspended like an airborne portal between the trees.

Alison Hall Cooley

Sensuous and infectiously playful, Easton artist Alison Cooley's mixed media works are all about change and fleeting interactions. In her show, Tidal, on view through September 27, her offhand scribbles and pools of deep, seductive blues and greens evoke watery movement and shifting atmospheres. Working with acrylic ink, oil pastel, pencil, pen, and marker on yupo paper, a super-smooth, waterproof synthetic paper, she marries drawing and painting in deceptively casual dialogues between color and linework, texture and smoothness, tension and flow.

Mary McCoy

Environmental artist Mary McCoy is a firm believer in letting nature speak for itself. In her show, Listening, on view October 1 through November 29, natural materials including bones, pressed leaves, butterfly wings, and turtle shells mingle casually with poetry, pencil drawings, and colorful acrylic paint. Sometimes meditative, sometimes thought-provoking, and often comic, her works range from tiny panels to wall-sized sculptures. Familiar to many Arboretum visitors for the outdoor sculptures she creates in collaboration with her husband, Howard McCoy, in this gallery show, McCoy offers an intimate look at her encounters with nature on her riverside farm near Centreville. There will be a reception to meet the artist on Saturday, October 26 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Jeremy Joseph

There's a playful innocence about the sprightly birds in Easton artist Jeremy Joseph's oil paintings. On view December 3 through January 31, his show, Winter Birds Dream of Summer, is full of stories begging to be imagined. Painted in wintry shades of the palest blue-grays accented with a few bright bits of color and touches of collage, these are highly simplified scenes, but they are warmed and made enticing by the curious things going on. Birds gesture like courtiers, hop in the air around a bare stick of a tree, or carry houseplants on their backs. These paintings are all about sparking the process of creative imagination, a talent Joseph has developed not only in his own artwork but as a longtime art teacher at Easton Elementary School. There will be a reception to meet the artist on Saturday, December 14 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Needle Felting 101: Sculpting with Wool

Sunday, November 10, 1–4 p.m. Fee: \$50 members/\$60 non-members All materials are provided Needle felting is the art of sculpting wool with special barbed needles, usually on a "platform" of foam rubber or foam core. In this introductory workshop led by Laura Rankin, students will learn

and practice this completely dry form of felting by making basic 3D shapes, including a ball (used to make an acorn ornament) and a simple figure. They'll also learn to attach appendages and to use templates to make small flat pieces such as ornaments or brooches.

Painting with Wool

Instead of using canvas or paper, students will create pictures with dyed wool batt on a 9" x 12" piece of commercial felt using basic needle felting techniques. Each student needs to bring two or three pieces of felt—any color-which can be purchased inexpensively at craft stores. Students should also bring reference photos for the wool creations they will be making—for example, a photo of a still life, a pet, a landscape, or a favorite design.
